Philosophy of Education

Hope Academy was established to provide the children of the city with a rigorous, Godcentered, classical education.

What do we mean by a God-centered education?

"The decline in American public education is not due to poor teaching or lack of funding; it is due to educational theories that deny the existence of transcendent truth and morality, that re-nounce standards of excellence, and ultimately render children unteachable." – Chuck Colson

There is an undeniable connection between the phenomenal growth of secular humanism in our day and the disastrous decline of our nation's schools. The disintegration of a biblical worldview has doomed our city's children to a lifetime of failure.

At Hope Academy, we believe the chief goal and purpose of all things—including education--is to love God and love our neighbor. True education is literally impossible without such a transcendent goal and purpose.

The Bible teaches us that all knowledge comes from God, and therefore, all knowledge has unity. At Hope Academy, we teach all subjects as part of an integrated whole, with the Scriptures at the center. Students are equipped to know and love the truth and to utilize that knowledge to glorify God in all things.

Why must the education at Hope Academy be academically rigorous?

There is no place for *shoddy* Christian education. We are preparing Minneapolis' next generation of leaders, therefore we must equip them with the core knowledge to take on the most demanding leadership roles required of the 21st century. An academically rigorous course of study will best prepare students to deal purposefully and responsibly with the complex issues of living in this present society.

What do we mean by a classical education?

For centuries, education was grounded on an emphasis of imparting the basic tools of learning, designed to equip students in verbal and reasoning skills within a God-centered view of life. Today's departure from teaching the basics has resulted in the current trend of declining student achievement.

Dorothy Sayers, a renowned Oxford trained educator, in her essay, "The Lost Tools of Learning," defined the structure of the classic educational process and found that it fit the natural learning development of children. She showed that the key elements of classical education – Grammar, Logic, and Rhetoric – corresponded with the four natural learning stages of a child:

1.	Beginning Grammar	Grades K-3	Ages 5-8	Reading/Writing
2.	Grammar	Grades 3-6	Ages 9-11	Writing
3.	Logic	Grades 7-9	Ages 12-14	Thinking
4.	Rhetoric	Grades 10-12	Ages 15-18	Speaking

Hope Academy is both, traditional and classical – learning from the great literature of our Christian heritage, combined with an emphasis on the basics of mathematics, science, history, and language.

Family Covenant

We ask parents/guardians of students at Hope Academy to renew the promises they made in signing our Family Covenant. Below is our Family Covenant that we partner with families in upholding:

In recognition of the promises of Hope Academy to provide your child with an outstanding Christ-centered education, and that my child's success in school depends largely on my support and involvement:

- I accept the school's mission statement, beliefs, and strategies of education that are in accordance with the Word of God and Biblical virtues.
- I agree to support the school in upholding its rules and policies as outlined in the appropriate Parent-School Handbook. As a parent, I am responsible for the behavior and actions of my child.
- I agree to participate in mandatory parent activities, including a Parent
 Orientation, teacher home visits, two Parent Involvement Days, two parentteacher conferences, volunteer service during the year, and attend the annual
 tuition conference.
- I agree to pay the "Fair Share" portion of my child's tuition that has been mutually agreed upon by parent and the school at an annual tuition conference.
- I agree to provide a supportive, educational environment for my child, which includes:
 - I will make sure my child arrives at Hope every day by the start of every school day (Mon.-Fri.)
 - I will make sure my child follows the Hope Academy dress code.
 - I will ensure that my child attends the Hope Summer Session
 - I will check my child's homework every night, try to read with him/her every night, and limit the amount of television he/she watches.

Failure to adhere to these commitments can cause my student to lose various privileges and can lead to my child's removal from Hope Academy.

The Hope Declaration

We go to Hope Academy, a Kingdom School. We exalt the name of Jesus. We recognize his presence here.

We believe in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. We believe the Bible to be God's holy word, to be complete truth, a guide for our feet. Policies and Procedures

Attendance

Hope Academy shall adhere to the regulations of the state of Minnesota concerning school attendance. The school shall develop appropriate procedures to ensure attendance.

Regular school attendance is mandatory for the growth and success of the students. Therefore, excessive, unexcused absences will not be tolerated. Parents are required to call the office by 10:00 a.m. to report the name of their absent child and the cause of the absence from school.

There are two conditions for which a child's absence is normally excused. These are 1) personal illness, and 2) death in the family. Please provide written notification to the office for consideration of all other absences.

Three unexcused absences will result in a student being placed on probation for the remainder of the quarter. If a student is absent without excuse again during that quarter he or she may be dismissed from Hope Academy.

Accidents

- Parents or legal guardians are called promptly whenever there is an accident.
- The school must have current day and evening phone numbers for parents of every child.
- The teacher will act in place of the parent if the parent cannot be reached.
- The school keeps a record of any accident.

Appointments

Please make every effort to schedule doctor's appointments either before or after school hours. We understand that this is not always possible. Parents should call the office or send a note ahead of time so that the teacher can prepare for the dismissal of the student. All students leaving for and arriving from appointments should check in and out at the school office.

Birthday Celebrations

Student birthdays will be celebrated according to teachers of individual classrooms.

- Parents should coordinate with the teacher if they want to provide a store-bought treat for the entire class.
- Please do not send party favors to school without making arrangements with the teacher.

Breakfast

Breakfasts are served daily for all Hope Academy students.

Calendar

Hope Academy has a 10-month school year. The calendar will, in large part, follow the holiday schedule for Minneapolis Public Schools with the addition of a Summer Session. See the Hope Academy website for a complete calendar of holidays and other school events at www.hopeschool.org

Child Abuse

The staff of Hope Academy is required by state law to report any suspected signs of child abuse to the Department of Children, Families, and Learning. This report may be made directly to the DCFL without first contacting the parents.

Communication

Emails: Each Saturday you will receive an email to let you know that announcements have been updated on the school website: www.hopeschool.org Stay informed about what going on in school and activities by reading The Hope Happenings every week. Paper copies can be sent home by request through the Office.

Text Messages: Please text the word "subscribe" to 67587 to receive text alerts from Hope Academy [late buses, snow days, etc]. Cell phone numbers must already be in our database. Text charges may apply.

Conferences with Teachers and Parents

- Attendance at the two scheduled parent-teacher conferences (November and February) is mandatory.
- Teachers and parents may request conferences at other times as well.

Hope Academy teachers believe parents are the first and primary educators of each child, and they seek to support you in your responsibility of being a godly parent.

Confidentiality and Release of Records and Information

- All student records are considered confidential.
- Information regarding admission, academic progress, test scores, health records, attendance or discharge of a student will be confidential and restricted to staff designated to have appropriate access to the information.
- Parents may have access to their child's permanent record at any time.
- Student academic and health records will be released upon payment of applicable tuition and fees that have accrued on the student's account.

Discipline Approach

As we encourage our students to love the Lord according to Matthew 22:37 we believe that there should be evidence of this love reflected in their behavior. Our role as teachers and staff is to shepherd their hearts by leading, guiding, protecting, and nurturing them to develop Christ-like character by the power of the Holy Spirit.

There are expectations that we have for our students that we believe reflect our values that are rooted in our commitment to place our hope in God. As we shepherd the hearts of our students at times we will need to provide the loving correction that comes from guiding and nurturing their hearts.

We are a "no excuses" school, and our culture is oriented around character and achievement. As much as possible, behavior incidents will be seen as opportunities for growth rather than nuisances or problems.

When a student is needing more time for shepherding, a process of reflection for learning and growth will be used. This process is based on the words in the Hope Values.

Extracurricular Activities

A student who does not attend school will not be allowed to participate in after-school activities that day.

Field Trips

- Field trips will be scheduled periodically.
- Parents will be notified in advance of each field trip. A comprehensive permission slip for all trips will be signed by a parent/guardian at the beginning of each year.
- Students will be excused from a field trip only with prior written permission from a parent or guardian.
- Parents may be invited by the classroom teacher to join the class as chaperones. A
 background check is needed for all adults accompanying students on a field trip.

Drills

Emergency procedures, such as fire, tornado, and lock down drills are practiced at various times throughout the year. Contact the main office if you have questions about these drills.

Health Forms

Every student must have a health history and medical record form filled out by a medical doctor. Immunizations must be up to date as required by the State of Minnesota. These records will be kept on file as part of your child's permanent health record. Any student without necessary documentation of immunizations will be barred from classes after October 1.

Home Visits

Home Visits are a time for the teachers to get to know you (the parents) better, taking place in mid-October. The teachers take time to come to each of their students' houses to meet with you. This also offers your child the opportunity to see that both you and the teacher are partnering in their educational experience.

Illness

- Do not send sick children to school.
- If your child is ill, please call the school by 10:00 a.m. to notify them of the situation.
- The school has no provision for sick children and will not allow them to stay in school.
- If an illness develops while the child is in school, a parent or guardian will be called to pick up the child immediately.
- After having had a fever of 100 degrees or higher, a child should not return to school until 24 hours after the fever has subsided.
- If the child has a communicable disease, (for example, head lice, ringworm, pinkeye, etc.), please notify the office at once.
- After being diagnosed for a bacterial infection, (for example, strep throat, ear infection, etc.), a child may return to the classroom 24 hours after an antibiotic is first administered.

Mandatory Parent Involvement

There are events that Hope believes will strengthen the parent partnership with the school which are mandatory for all Hope families. Events on campus will require a signin to verify your attendance. Please check the school calendar on the website for this year's specific dates.

Medications

Medication should be given at home if at all possible. No internal medication of any kind will be administered at school unless specific instructions are given by the parent. Parents will be required to submit a medical authorization form, releasing school personnel from liability. Medications brought to school must be given immediately to school nurse upon arrival and may be dispensed only by an authorized adult.

Non-Discrimination Policy

Hope Academy admits students of any race, color, religion, national or ethnic origin. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national or ethnic origin in the administration of its educational policies, admission policies, or scholarship and financial aid programs.

Parent Orientation Meeting

At the beginning of the school year, a Parent Orientation Meeting will include a brief overview of the curriculum, teaching methods, and discipline policies used at Hope Academy. This is a mandatory event. If a parent cannot attend the scheduled meeting, the parent must schedule an alternative meeting.

Parent Involvement Days

In order to encourage parent/child interaction and build community within the school, we will have Parent Involvement Day two times during the year. All students will attend a half day of school together with their parents, becoming involved in classroom and school-wide activities. These are held on Saturday mornings, 9am-12pm. Students will wear uniforms.

Report Cards/Parent-Teacher Conferences

Student progress reports are issued four times a year, at the end of each grading period. Report cards will include evaluative comments from the teacher. Parent-Teacher Conferences are held twice a year to discuss your child's academics, and they are mandatory for parents to attend.

School Closings

Hope Academy closings due to bad weather will typically correspond to those of the Minneapolis Public School District. Listen to WCCO 830-AM radio, Channel 4 TV, or check www.wcco.com on the Internet for school closings due to snow or severe weather. In addition, the school will be closed for any reasons deemed to be unsafe to students. If you would like to receive text alerts on your mobile device, look at the Parent Portal on the website for the instructions to subscribe.

School Visitors

Parents are never to go directly to a classroom without checking in at the office. Parents are encouraged to observe and volunteer in their child's classroom, but arrangements must be made in advance through the school office. All volunteers and chaperone will complete a background check before working with students.

School visitors must check in at the office and wear a visitor badge while in the building. Visitors should not use restrooms designated for student use. Only authorized school visitors wearing a nametag should be in the hallways during school hours.

Summer Session

Summer Session is an important time for continuing and extending our regular curriculum to keep our academic progress strong throughout the year. We focus on geography topics and consolidate math concepts to prepare for the next school year. Each class takes 2 or 3 field trips.

Summer Session is mandatory for all Lower School students. Summer Session is typically the 2nd week in June through the 1st week in July, Mondays through Thursdays from 8:30-12:30. Students who are unexcused during Summer Session are not guaranteed a space for the coming school year. Summer Session waivers are only granted in special cases by approval of the Lower School Principal.

Suspensions

The decision to suspend a student rests upon the Lower School Principal in consultation with the Dean of Students and/or the classroom teacher. A re-entry meeting is required before any student is allowed to return to school at Hope.

Teachers will discuss a student's misconduct privately with the student. Teachers will document in writing the use of discipline, and may report disciplinary measures to the child's parent when the teacher believes such reports are necessary. Corporal punishment will not be used.

Parents will be contacted if the school receives a report of student misconduct while on the school bus. If a student receives three misconduct reports, they will be suspended from the school bus for one week. If that student receives another report of misconduct, they will again be suspended from the school bus for a week. If they student receives a fifth misconduct report, they will no longer be allowed to ride the school bus. Remember that Hope Academy uses bussing services from Minneapolis Public Schools, so we are obligated to follow MPS bus policies.

Tardiness/Early Pick-Up

We believe that students at Hope Academy are forming character traits today that will carry them through the rest of their lives and affect their future in powerful ways. Tardiness and early pick-up has an inescapable affect on a student's progress and on learning to lead a disciplined life. Therefore, parents will be expected to model responsibility by making sure their child arrives at school on time and prepared for the day, and that they finish out their complete school day.

We understand that situations will occasionally arise that will cause a student to be late, i.e. a flat tire, bad weather, etc. But excessive tardiness will not be tolerated. Students should be in their classrooms at 9:55. Students who arrive at school after 9:55 will be considered tardy. Late arriving and early dismissal students must sign in at main desk. Three tardies and/or early pick-ups in one quarter will be considered an unexcused absence.

Testing

All new and some returning students are tested for qualifying for Title I services during the first three weeks of school. Parents will be informed if their child will be receiving Title I services. Student progress is carefully monitored on a daily, bi-weekly, and quarterly basis. Developmental Reading Assessments will be given at least twice a year to assess reading comprehension and decoding skills. The NWEA Measures of Academic Progress will be administered to students in third grade and above each fall and spring. Nonnative English speakers will receive a language test. These tests are used for internal benchmarks and are reported as a large group in the Hope Academy Annual Report. Individual scores are distributed to families upon request.

Times for School

The regular school day for Lower School is 9:55-4:15. Busses leave at 4:30.

Before School

Doors open at 9:45. A staff member will be at the gym door for parent drop-offs between 9:30-10:00. Students should not be left at the school before that time, as

there will be no supervision, unless they are enrolled in the Before School Care program (see the office for this).

Before School Care is also available daily from 7:45-9:45 at a cost of 10% of a student's tuition (monthly). If you are interested in this program, please inquire in the Main Office.

After School

Lower School is dismissed at 4:15, Upper School at 4:25. Busses leave at 4:30. Late pick up of students from school will not be allowed, and a fee will be charged after 4:40. (\$10 per 15 minutes) Only adults whose names you have given the school on your child's authorized pick up list will be allowed to take a student off the school premises unless parental consent is given ahead of time. Your child will not be allowed to go with any unauthorized person.

Any change from the normal after school transportation arrangements must be made by either calling the school office or sending a note by 3:00. No changes will be made after this time.

Students should not be checked out of school before 4:15 except in the case of personal illness. Picking a child up before 4:15 three times in one quarter will be considered an unexcused absence.

Tuition

The actual cost to attend Hope Academy is approximately \$7,300 per student. Most of this cost is subsidized by contributions made by people who believe in quality Christian education. All parents must pay their monthly Fair Share portion by the 10th day of each month, according to their registration agreement.

The re-enrollment process for current students begins in January. A family deposit is expected at that time. Students will not be allowed to begin school until the first tuition payment is received.

If a family's tuition payments fall behind, the person responsible must make arrangements with the office in order for the student to remain in class. Any student whose tuition is two months behind will be barred from class until appropriate arrangements have been made with the business manager.

A mandatory family tuition conference will be held April.

Transportation

We want to facilitate safe routines for students as they come and go from school. Parents can help by following these practices if your children do not ride the bus and are dropped off with a private vehicle.

MORNING DROP OFF

- Vehicles dropping students must use the 22nd Ave cul-de-sac area for dropping, not the bus lanes on Chicago Ave, even if there are no buses present at that moment. Students must of in the North Gym Door (#2)
- Hope will provide supervision at the North Gym Door (#2) from 9:30-10:00.
- Doors do not open until 9:45.
- Students who are registered for ASC or Before School Care may come to the Chicago Ave. entrance at their designated times.
- Parents who wish to enter the building in the morning must find a regular parking spot.
- After 10:00, all students must enter through the Chicago Ave entrance (#1) and receive a tardy pass before going to class.


AFTERNOON PICK UP

• Street parking while you wait in available on 22nd Ave. from the corner to the cul-de-sac. If this is full, you may also wait on Park Ave.

 After dismissal time (approximately 4:15), teachers will escort Lower School students to meet their parents at their waiting cars. Upper School students may

walk unaccompanied.

- When your child is safely in your car, please drive ahead to the cul-de-sac area to turn around and return to Park Ave.
- If parents are not in the pick-up area by 4:30, students will be escorted to the main entry lobby to be picked up by you. Parents are charged \$10 for each 15 minutes of late pickups.
- Do not drive through the hospital parking lots.



Uniforms

Students will be expected to wear pre-approved uniforms at all times. The goal of our school uniform is that our students will have a neat and clean appearance, showing respectfulness in their grooming and portraying professionalism in the school environment.

Students should wear their complete uniform to and from school. Students will not be allowed to change clothes at school. If a child arrives at school not wearing a complete uniform, the parent will be called to come to the school and bring the uniform.

The following items may **not** be worn to school:

- hats
- bandanas
- turtlenecks
- tights with designs, colored leggings other than navy blue or black
- jeans or jeggings
- tennis shoes (unless for recess and gym)

Personal items such as: electronics, cell phones, trading cards, toys, toy "weapons" and distracting jewelry will be confiscated by the teacher if brought to school, and will need to be picked up by the parent.

Volunteer Experience

All Hope Academy parents must demonstrate their commitment to the community focus of the school by volunteering for at least 2 school events. Parents should choose from the list of service opportunities that best fit their gifts, abilities, and schedules. Each classroom is responsible for one school event and you can choose the other from a list of service opportunities. A parent liaison coordinator will track, document, and facilitate volunteer efforts and assignments.

Wellness Policy

Hope Academy has a Wellness Policy, intended to promote a school culture committed to healthy lifestyles. Some of the objectives that the policy includes are nutrition education, encouraging physical activity, and healthy food choices. Parents are invited to participate in implementing and assessing the Wellness Policy.
